

# Presidential Primary Poll

With one week remaining before the Tennessee presidential primary, about one in four voters in both parties remain undecided about which candidate will receive their vote on Super Tuesday. However, over the past week there has been some significant realignment of support for both the Republicans and the Democrats.

This poll shows large numbers of voters in both parties who are strongly interested in participating in the February 5 vote, but who have not chosen a specific candidate to support. The poll was conducted among 811 registered Tennessee voters across the entire state who indicated likelihood to vote on Super Tuesday. In the past week, however, there was been a decrease of 6% in the percentage of registered voters who say they are "very likely" to vote, possibly reflecting the disappointment of some over the withdrawal of Senator Thompson.

### **Democratic Race**

Among the Democrats, Senator John Edwards' support largely dissolved (and this survey was taken before Edwards' decision to withdraw). Most of his supporters – nearly all of whom were white – shifted to the Hillary Clinton camp. At the same time, a significant portion of Clinton's support among African-Americans has moved to Barack Obama's camp.

Clinton now leads with 36% of the overall vote, but Obama is competitive with 31%. Again, a substantial number of undecided voters remain.

### Republican Race

On the Republican side, since the withdrawal of Senator Fred Thompson, John McCain and Mitt Romney have become competitive in the race and are now within reach of Mike Huckabee. In this new survey, nearly half of Republican voters said they had planned to vote for Thompson prior to his decision to drop out of the race.

### How the Poll was Conducted

This poll was conducted as a telephone survey among registered Tennessee voters, ages 18 and older who indicated that they are "likely" or "very likely" to vote in the February 5 presidential primary. There were 811 respondents who participated, giving the poll a margin of error of +/- 5% at the 95% confidence level. All interviews were conducted over a two-day period from January 28 through 29. Age, gender, race and geographic representation among respondents mirrors current Tennessee Census demographics. Data was not weighted. Interviews were conducted in all Tennessee counties.

This poll was commissioned by WSMV-TV/Nashville and conducted by Crawford Johnson & Northcott, Inc., a national marketing research company based in Des Moines, Iowa.
